CNC for All Levels

Tuesdays, September 27–October 25 Thursdays, September 29–October 27 6–9pm 5 sessions cost: \$425 Students will create a finished 3D work, gain experience

in creating Adobe Illustrator files, and explore processes in greater depth. Students will design projects in Adobe Illustrator, learn how to convert the files on the computer, and prepare and cut the files on the Shopbot CNC. Class demonstrations will include an introduction to the drag knife attachment.

Encaustic Workshop: Merging Layers CEPT 430 00

Monday–Friday, November 14–18 6–9pm 5 sessions cost: \$375

This new workshop will introduce you to the timeless and limitless creativity and techniques of painting in hot wax and color. The Greeks practiced encaustic painting as early as the 5th century BC for use in portraiture and decoration. It is still widely used today by such modern masters as Jasper Johns, Lynda Benglis, Robert Morris, and Robert Rauschenberg. Many new artists have turned encaustics into a cross-disciplinary medium, extending its use from painting to collage, assemblage, and printmaking.

Introduction to Digital Animation

CEAN 110 00

September 19–November 7 6:30–9:30pm 8 sessions cost: \$325

Students will take the first steps towards bringing their art to life through computer animation. Demonstrations and hands on exercises will expose students to the basic theory and mechanics behind animation as well as the fundamentals of the software. Students will use Adobe Flash and After Effects to learn how to combine art and technology to create visually engaging animations. *Zach Sabatino '14*

Painting with Fire

CEJM 170 00 September 19–November 7 6–9pm 8 sessions cost: \$370

This class will focus on images in enamel. We will begin with basic techniques including drawing, painting, templates, and image transfer techniques. Enameling is the process of fusing powdered glass to metal, which yields a permanent image on metal. Enamel offers an exceptional range of colors and surfaces, transparent and opaque. This class is open to beginning and advanced students. Bring a sketchbook, your favorite tools, and your creativity!

Introduction to Bookbinding

CEFM 120 00

September 19–November 7 6–9pm 8 sessions cost: \$325

Learn the basics of hand-made book production, including techniques that can be done at home. We will explore a variety of Western and Eastern binding styles and materials by creating journals, sketchbooks, artist's books, zines, and sculptural books. Students will leave with a better understanding of materials and binding to best suit their goals.

Painting from the Natural World

September 19–November 7 6:30–9:30pm 8 sessions cost: \$325

In this course you will work from elements found in nature to create paintings that are inspired by their patterns and forms. You will come to more fully understand and appreciate the unique character of your subjects as you depict them in an array of styles ranging from realism to abstraction. Demonstrations and discussions will be provided to encourage experimentation and creative growth. This course is open to all levels of experience. Students may use any type of paint that they are comfortable working with in this class.

Artists Books: Sequence and Image CEFM 235 00

September 19–November 7 6–9pm 8 sessions cost: \$325

In this intensive class, students will learn how to turn their ideas into hand-printed and hand-bound limited edition artist books.They will start with basic bookbinding structures, and move into content generation and development. Students will learn how narrative and pacing impact various book formats and vice versa. They will learn to create imagery on a Vandercook flatbed printing press, as well as create low-tech imagery using gelatin plates and stencil techniques for their books. At the end of 8 weeks, everyone will leave with a sampling of binding and printing methods, as well as a set of artist books that are traded in class.

Acrylic Painting: Discovering Color CEPT 135.00

September 19–November 7 6:30–9:30pm 8 sessions cost: \$325

Are you ready to paint and explore the dark and light side of color? Working with acrylics you will move quickly from experiments to final paintings. This course will teach the principle of color such as values, shades, tints, brightness and saturation. Learn to mix and match colors and then see how they appear to change before your eyes on the canvas. Realistic or abstract, color choices bring expression and thought to your work more than any other element. Join us for this eye opening course! José Sacaridiz

Abstract Painting

September 20–November 8 6:30–9:30pm 8 sessions cost: \$325

Abstract painting is a conscious breakaway from traditional realistic painting. A unique decision made over a century ago retains great value today. Since then, many abstract artists have made important contributions to the art world. Perhaps one of the most significant contributions was changing the public perception of what art should represent. The personal approach to art making is a newer idea within visual art history. The class introduces concepts and techniques used by masters of Abstraction. Three different artists influence the class direction. The artists for the summer session are: Joan Miro, Piet Mondrian and Roy Lichtenstein. Ideas discussed and practiced in class include: color as subject, painting as object, and multiple process applications. In the studio, we will work together towards our goals. Two paintings are made from each artist. The first painting is small in scale, simple, and is considered a study or investigation piece. The second painting is large in scale, complex, and is considered a final or finished piece. All of the paintings aim to visually emulate specific styles. Acrylic paint application and color mixing will be presented through instructor demonstrations.

Drawing: Foundation and Fundamentals

September 20–November 8 6:30–9:30pm 8 sessions cost: \$325

Drawing is not about mastery of the hand but about the eye. It is the ability to learn to see anew, to understand, to represent and ultimately to express one's own vision. This course will teach you step by step, through personal instruction and demonstrations.

We will first draw single objects through direct observation, eventually progressing to still life arrangements. Each week will focus on a different aspect of drawing: line, form, relationship, perspective, shading, and texture. In addition, a sketchbook will be used to take notes as well as for assignments between classes.

Business of Art

CEFD 230 00

September 20–October 25 6:30–8:30pm 6 sessions cost: \$300

This course is designed as a first-step towards helping the developing artist make a successful transition from creating art to presenting and promoting it. Mary Urbas will share her 35 years of experience on both sides of the business of art as a gallery owner, curator, teacher, consultant, as well as an exhibited fiber artist. *Course limited to 10 students*.

Wheel Throwing: Beginning + Advanced CECR 200 00

September 20–November 8 6–9pm 8 sessions cost: \$345

Discover throwing on the potter's wheel to create forms ranging from refined porcelain vessels to rustic teabowls to sculptural objects. We will begin with fundamental elements of centering and making cylinders, cups, bowls, and plates, and continue by exploring form and scale. Finishing surfaces with various methods of carving, joining, and decorating will also be included. Everyone has a unique way of touching clay and this will be an opportunity to get better acquainted with your unique touch while using the wheel. Please bring sketches of forms, decorative patterns or drawings, texturing tools, basic pottery tools, a small bucket, a towel, and plastic to cover work. All experience levels are welcome. *Amy Halko*

Wednesdays

Assemblage Sculpture

CEFM 370 00 September 21–November 9 6–9pm 8 sessions cost: \$325

This class will examine Cornell's boxes, Rauschenberg's combines, and Nevelson's monochrome constructions. Students will be introduced to concepts and to techniques used by these three artists. Manipulation of various twoand three-dimensional materials will develop skills that involve composition, shallow relief construction, color, shape, scale, and appropriation. The appropriation of an object could include print, picture, plastics, glass, or any commodity found in popular culture. The objects are arranged and manipulated to create a logic not previously determined. Objects can act as visual triggers to evoke memories, create nostalgic feelings or imply a narrative. Therefore, if you have a junk drawer, thrift store finds, antiques, toys, odds and ends, bits and pieces, put them into a box and we will start working.

Independent Projects in Ceramics

September 21–November 9 6–9pm 8 sessions cost: \$325

In this course, intermediate and advanced students will have the opportunity to work on an independent ceramics project with guidance from a technical specialist. Propose a project to develop throughout this course using the CIA ceramics facilities in a structured, open-studio environment. This course is intended for the ceramics



student capable of working independently in consultation with a technical assistant. All studio work must take place during class time. Please bring a proposed project and timeline the first day of class.

Introduction to Blacksmithing

September 21–November 9 8 sessions 6–9pm cost: \$400

This class is an introductory exploration of basic metal forging, balanced between creative expression and sculpture alongside the traditional methodology of blacksmithing. After a brief orientation of blacksmithing in both the historical and contemporary context, students will learn appropriate safety procedures, the proper use of the tools and equipment available in the CIA Fabrication Studios, and the process of shaping hot metal. *Course limited to 6 students.*

Introduction to Photoshop CEPH 200 00

September 21–November 9 6–9pm 8 sessions cost: \$325

This course will focus on the basic yet powerful features of Photoshop in editing photographs as well as documenting artwork. Students will discover the vast possibilities of traditional tools and develop an understanding of layering techniques. Students are encouraged to bring their own images to work on during studio time. Throughout this course you will learn the tools you need to be more efficient in your photo-editing skills like basic photo repairs and color enhancement in order to increase the flexibility and quality of your photographs. *Anna Tararova*

Narrative Collage: Creating Your Visual Story

September 21–November 9 6:30–9:30pm 8 sessions cost: \$325

Join us as we utilize collage to reveal your past and present in your own visual voice. Discover personal identities within a narrative context. The primary materials used to explore your story will come from a wide variety of sources: family photos, oral and written histories, maps, art, ephemera, and found objects. We will look at the relationships between personal experience, culture, and memory to create a unique pictorial chronicle. By expressing the extraordinary within the ordinary, you will find new understandings and discoveries to your own past while creating a visual legacy for others. You are invited to join us on this highly personal, creative and unique journey—the only limits are your investigation, memory and imagination!

Jewelry + Metals: Techniques + Process CEJM 430 00

September 21–November 9 6–9pm 8 sessions cost: \$370

Students will enjoy working with non-ferrous metals in this advanced jewelry class to create wearable art pieces. Students will incorporate advanced techniques including forging, advanced soldering, bezel setting stones, and etching/roll printing textures/patterns to create surface designs, and will gain further understanding of the jewelry making process. The design process will be explored through multiple concept sketches and class discussions. Students will complete two pieces by the end of the session. Back to Basics: Jewelry + Metalsmithing 101 or equivalent prerequisite required. *Course limited to 10 students.*

Alternative Origami

CEFM 275 00 September 21–November 9 6:30–9:30pm 8 sessions cost: \$325

In recent decades, the age-old art of paper folding has taken on a number of new and interesting forms that deviate from its traditional, Japanese roots. This course will delve into the non-representational realm of folding, leaving students with experience in: basic tessellation folding; advanced pleating methods, and the creation of elegant spiral forms with paper. We will also examine different ways these techniques can be applied as design elements in other mediums such as installation art, architecture, photography, book making, and much more. At different points throughout the course, we will still cross back over into more traditional forms of origami that incorporate these techniques in striking ways.

About Face: Portraits

CEPT 100 00 September 22–November 10 6:30–9:30pm 8 sessions cost: \$325

This course is an exploration in the history and art of portraiture. Learn to open your eye and steady your hand! In this course focus on rendering skills, while also exploring creative ways to interpret personality and expression. From realistic model drawing/painting to more abstracted methods of representation, this course is great for both practice and trying new things. Steel Fabrication: MIG Welding CESC 150 00

September 22–November 10 6:30–9:30pm 8 sessions cost: \$300

This course will function as an introductory level overview of basic MIG welding and steel fabrication techniques. Individuals will be asked to present a proposal for an independent project to be completed during the six-week timeframe. Large or small, functional or purely sculptural works are all encouraged. The course will cover basic aesthetic and structural considerations, a variety of steel fabrication techniques and strategies, as well as a brief tutorial on the mechanics of metal inert gas welding and proper shop safety procedures.

Beginning Painting

September 22–November 10 6:30–9:30pm 8 sessions cost: \$325

In this introductory painting course students will learn the fundamental techniques and processes of painting with acrylic paint. Class projects will target basic painting principles and guide students to develop a better understanding of tools and materials, acrylic paint and mediums, basic color theory, and two-dimensional design concepts. Discussions, demonstrations, and handouts will provide students with valuable resources to facilitate good painting practices and artistic growth.

Watercolor Landscapes

CEPT 375 00 September 22–November 10 6:30–9:30pm 8 sessions cost: \$325

Watercolor landscapes will introduce the foundations of working with watercolor paints in the studio environment. Watercolor painting makes use of transparent washes and in doing so allows for a bright image. A painting made with watercolor paints uses the white paper as a mirror to reflect and capture a luminous guality. Topics discussed and demonstrated in class are color theory, paint application, painting techniques, and paint manipulation. Each example will incorporate a new color theory lesson and a painting technique. You will be shown how to paint elements found in the landscape such as skies, rural and cosmopolitan environments, trees, and water. Many small quick paintings and fast dry time permits for a wide range of tricks and topics to explore. Almost all paintings are guided with a step by step process from beginning to end. Both group and individual attention will aid in your painting's focus and direction. The beginner and novice painter will be encouraged.

Creative Clay Studio

Grades 6–10 YACR 350 00 Saturdays September 24–November 19 1–4pm 8 sessions cost: \$275

Young artists are welcome in the clay studio at the Cleveland Institute of Art. Explore your imagination by creating sculpture and pottery through the use of this tactile material. You will learn the skills of hand-building and working on the potter's wheel as you develop and translate your ideas into three-dimensional works of art. You will finish off your creations with high temperature (2350° F) glazes that will be fired off in our professional level kilns. High school students have the opportunity to develop their portfolios for high school or college admission. Be prepared to get messy! Drawing Beyond the Pencil

Grades 5–8 YAFD 215 00 Saturdays September 24–November 19 9:30am–12:30pm 8 sessions cost: \$325

Sharpen your drawing skills and expand your artistic horizons using a variety of traditional and non-traditional materials. You will take your drawing abilities to a whole new level with projects designed to expand the application of fundamental drawing practices in new ways. We will establish the importance of keeping sketchbooks using the foundation of drawing and essential elements of visual art to practice, plan, and communicate creative ideas. What is the difference between looking and seeing? Through inspirational field trips to University Circle institutions like the Cleveland Museum of Art and class discussion, we will address this question as essential to the creative processes of the visual artist. Glassblowing for Young Artists

Grades 9–12 YAGL 100 00 Saturdays September 24–November 19 9:30am–12:30pm 8 sessions cost: \$375

This introductory-level glassblowing class will teach you the basics of manipulating hot glass. Starting with the bubble, you will learn ways to develop blown forms out of glass. We will use basic functional shapes like cups, vases, and ornaments as building blocks to gain an understanding of how glassblowing works. Each class we will add a different type of blown form to try; however, you will be encouraged to bring ideas of shapes and forms that you would like to blow. These will include printed images, papers, drawings and fabrics, as well as found and natural objects. Graduating from Cleveland State with a BA in Studio Arts, Melissa continues to stay active in the Cleveland art scene. Elizabeth Beganyi Naugle began her art career at Cleveland Institute of Art studying the Foundation program for two years, and then moved to New York to attend New York University with an intended double major in Art History/ Archaeology. She ended up graduating from Cleveland State University with a Bachelor's in Art (Drawing) with Education Licensure. She has recently completed her Masters in Business from Baldwin Wallace and currently works at the Cleveland Clinic as a Project Manager in the Office of Construction. This year marks her seventeenth year with the Clinic. She has decided to come back to the Continuing Education program to continue her passion for teaching art.

Radha Pandey is a papermaker and letterpress printer. She earned her MFA in Book Arts from the University of lowa Center for the Book where she studied Letterpress printing, Bookbinding and Papermaking with a focus on Western, Eastern, and Islamic Papermaking techniques taught by Timothy Barrett. 
